Captain Teri Uno Special Operations



The new space is the fourth departmental space in the police department's 50-year history. But what separates the new station apart from the previous three is that




it was designed and built from the ground up with partnerships from the Police Department, Planning and Development, Maintenance, and Procurement. The result is a state-of-the-art space designed to grow with the department for decades to come.

The space is an open concept, and there are additions that were considered that were never considered before: a sallyport with holding cells, pre-planned conference room technology, adequate space for leaders and staff to work, focus rooms for

meetings, mail slots for all members and future growth,

interview rooms designed for victims and suspects, and space for Federal partners. The result is a home

Technology and Evidence

Technology and Evidence

In law enforcement, transparency is key and goes hand in hand with professionalism. In March, our agency purchased Body Worn Cameras (BWC) along with cloud storage to further professionalize our agency. Our agency becomes the latest in the Tampa Bay area to embrace this technology and the cameras were rolled out in late September. Now all sworn personnel, from the Chief to the newest officer, wears the BWC. The purchase of Axon 3, along with cloud storage allows TPAPD to work with partners, such as the Hillsborough County State Attorney, to facilitate the safe transfer of evidential video. The cameras have assisted the officers in reports and arrests, and against any false complaints.

Accreditation

The accreditation process requires us to prove compliance with over 200 standards. During 2022, the Department continued to review and update departmental policies to meet changes in accreditation and Florida State Statutes.

Our accreditation process is a three-year cycle, and 2022 was year two of our cycle which means continual proof collection. We are ramping up for our CFA onsite in 2023.

Bias-based profiling occurs when, whether intentionally or unintentionally, an officer applies his or her own personal, societal, or organizational biases or stereotypes when making decisions or taking police action, and the ONLY reason for that decision or action is because of a person's race, ethnicity, background, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, culture or other personal characteristic, rather than due to the observed behavior of the individual or the identification of the individual as being, having been, or about to be engaged in criminal activity. It is the policy and practice of the Tampa International Airport Police Department to protect the Constitutional rights of all people, regardless of race, color, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, physical handicap, religion or other belief system or physical characteristic; and to treat each person with respect and dignity. While contacting persons in a variety of situations is not only routine, but also germane to law enforcement activities, the agency will not accept or tolerate bias-based profiling.

Patrol Division A Squad

March 15, 2022: While on patrol, Officer Runge came upon a vehicle v. motorcycle crash on Air Cargo Rd. and MLK. A southbound van turned left in front of the northbound motorcycle causing a high impact crash. Officer Runge, a nurse and an off-duty EMT provided medical care for the motorcycle rider until TFR and TPD arrived. Officer Runge's actions were instrumental in keeping the rider alive until he could be transported to the hospital. The rider survived with multiple injuries.

March 29, 2022: Chosen by the Chief, Captains, Managers of Traffic and Admin, Cameron was the unanimous selection for employee of the month. Officer Beall has established the first Traffic Units for the Tampa International Airport Police Department, Officer Beall was instrumental in coordinating a functional schedule for the Traffic personnel to be the most effective for the purpose of traffic mitigation while not taxing existing patrol staffing. He has also attended several meetings with FDOT and is coordinating the disbursement of a Speeding and Aggressive Driving grant as well as assisting in the procurement of the grant for the upcoming year.

April 20, 2022; Officer Matas assisted a Southwest passenger who left their purse at Airside C in a seating area. Officer Matas reviewed video and determined the purse had been stolen by a Flagship employee. Officer Matas did a great job identifying the employee who stole the purse and bringing the person to the police station for an interview, Officer Matas was assisted by Officer Dastas with Spanish translation. Officers Matas and Dastas were able to obtain a confession. He retrieved the purse and returned it to the complainant. The complainant declined prosecution but was grateful for the return of her purse.

May 15, 2022: Officer Griffith investigated the theft of an iPhone valued at \$1,000. The "Find my iPhone" app showed the phone left TPA and was at an address in Tampa. Officer Landry, officer-in-training Trapnell and Tampa Police Dept. units responded to the location and found a suspect in possession of the iPhone. The phone was recovered and returned to the victim. Victim did not wish to prosecute. Officers Griffith, Landry and Trapnell did an excellent job investigating a grand theft and recovering the property. They used their extensive experience and resources to return an iPhone to the victim, who was very appreciative of their efforts.

June 15, 2022: Officer Dastas responded to Airside E security screening reference a missing laptop. She reviewed video footage of the incident. Another passenger took the laptop and boarded his Delta Airlines flight to La Guardia. Officer Dastas was able to identify the passenger. She contacted Port Authority Police Department and spoke with Detective Ahmad. She also had assistance from TSA Assistant Federal Security Director, Greg Mertz, who put Officer Dastas in contact with Detective Sgt. from La Guardia Port Authority Police. The flight landed at La Guardia and detectives were able to make contact with the passenger that took the laptop. The laptop was recovered and mailed back to the owner.

August 25, 2022: Officer Perilla and Officer Griffith were on patrol at the RCC and identified a male as the subject of a BOLO. The officers developed information relating the subject to several GTAs. The subject was interviewed by SIU detectives and confessed to numerous crimes. Several cases were successfully closed due to attentiveness while patrolling on foot.

Patrol Division B Squad

May 8, 2022: Officer Bizzle assisted a family who became separated while at the airside. The mother of a 2-month-old baby seemed confused and separated from her husband at the gate area. Officer Bizzle reunited the family and determined they were in crisis because they didn't have enough formula for their trip. Officer Bizzle helped rebook their flight and also purchased formula for the family to have for their trip.

May 19, 2022: Officers responded to a Medical Call, possible heart attack on Blue Departure Drive. Numerous officers arrived on scene and observed an off-duty paramedic performing compressions on an elderly male. Officer Smith placed the AED pads on the elderly male, later identified as Mr. Greener. Officer Maggiacomo attempted to locate the victim's vitals. Officer Perilla arrived on scene and took over the compressions. Officer Smith monitored the AED which delivered three separate shocks. The officers continued to administer CPR until ARFF 9 arrived on scene. The victim was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital. Later in the evening, contact was made with the victim's son, who advised his father was alert and communicating.

May 30, 2022: Officer Lopez observed a subject driving a 2010 Kia Forte. The officer came into contact with the subject. Upon asking the subject to exit the vehicle, he did state, Pre-Miranda, that he had a firearm under his seat. The officer asked him to place his hands on the steering wheel and also inquired if he had a Concealed Carry permit. The subject acknowledged that he did not have a Concealed Carry permit. Upon arrival of back-up, he was removed from the vehicle. Upon opening the door, the officer observed a silver-colored revolver in a suede holster with no snap or safety. The firearm was not secured in a container in the vehicle and was easily accessible by the driver at any time. Recovered was a Taurus Titanium.38 Cal revolver fully loaded with five rounds.

July 3, 2022: Officer Lopez observed a Black Dodge Charger traveling on Blue Arrivals Drive. The registered owner of the vehicle had an active warrant out of Hillsborough County for Homicide. Officer Lopez initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle and came into contact with four male subjects in the vehicle. The driver indicated that the vehicle belonged to his father who has a warrant for Murder. The officer observed the Male/Hispanic in the back seat that entered the auto and matched the description of the wanted subject. Although the wanted subject was not in the vehicle, there were two guns in the center console of the vehicle. The driver was subsequently arrested and charged with providing a False Name to LEO and FOJ.

July 25,2022: Officer Tran responded to a property damage call at the Sky Center for approximately \$4,000.00 in damage to sprinkler heads which were pulled from the ground and broken off, damaged water lines and a damaged junction box. Officer Tran was able to visually identify the suspect with extensive review of video which led SIU to later make a positive identification and payment of restitution to the Aviation Authority.

September 14, 2022: Officer Lopez was assisting a US Postal OIG Agent on an investigation of a postal employee for allegedly bringing in a firearm and marijuana onto a postal facility (Federal Property). The officer observed the two Postal AIG Agents make contact with the subject who was exiting the postal facility. As the agents made contact with the employee, Officer Lopez observed him to be in possession of a red fanny pack which allegedly contained a firearm and marijuana. As the agents attempted to detain the employee, a struggle ensued, and the officer observed the employee forcibly pulling away from the agents. He then ran from the Postal Agents and was captured by Officer Lopez in Remote Economy after a brief foot chase. In November of 2022, the postal employee was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury.

Patrol Division C Squad

During the 2022 bid year, C Squad had incredible achievements that highlighted Tampa International Airport Police Department Values: Integrity; Passion; Diversity; Collaboration and Creativity. Members of the squad participated in the 5K Runway Run, Military Appreciation Event, Habitat for Humanity, MADD Vigil, Martin Luther King Jr. Parade, and Big Brothers and Big Sisters. Members of C Squad completed training to include IPMBA Bike Training, Internal Affairs, FBI LEEDA, Field Training, Iron Sharpened Leadership and Kinesics. C Squad members received multiple compliments and recognition throughout the year.

C Squad was on duty during Hurricane Ian. They worked together seamlessly to keep the airport safe and secured.

Listed below are some of the highlighted cases throughout 2022:

January 23, 2022: Officers responded to Sheltair reference a male subject that jumped over the fence onto the AOA. Officer Koehl conducted a foot pursuit, jumped the fence and later placed the suspect into custody with assistance of civilian retired officer. Additional officers on scene assisted with medical, scene security and searches of areas throughout the ramp. The Squad worked quickly and efficiently to locate suspect and secure AOA.

April 11, 2022; Officer Ruiz received information that a suspect from a previous theft was walking around the RCC. Ruiz located the subject and attempted to identify him along with Officer Smith. The subject provided several false names to identify himself. Corporal Pell spoke with subject's supervisor separately and obtained information. Officer Ruiz placed subject under arrest and Officer Smith transported him to ORJ.

April 11, 2022: Officer Maggiacomo responded along with Officers Basnight and Perilla reference a passenger who intentionally damaged HCAA property in the area of the jetway gate. The female had left the scene and Lt. Porter immediately went to cameras to assist. Sgt. Wood located the female in blue baggage and Officer Maggiacomo arrested the subject for Criminal Mischief.

May 19, 2022: Officers were dispatched to Blue Departures reference an unresponsive male. Officers Maggiacomo, Smith and Anaya arrived on-scene and assisted an off-duty paramedic (Patrick Kembla) with CPR, AED and vitals. Officer Perilla arrived on scene and took over chest compressions. Officers Koehl, Ruiz, and Basnight responded and assisted in directing traffic to keep the scene safe. Efforts from the entire squad contributed greatly to saving a man's life.

September 17, 2022: Officers responded to MRO Hangar reference a careless driver that left the roadway, struck the fence, and entered onto the AOA, Officer Smith made initial contact with the uncooperative driver and assessed the situation. Officer Sandel arrived and assisted in maintaining control/safety of the scene. Officer Ruiz arrived on-scene and determined that the driver was not impaired but careless. Officers Maggiacomo and Basnight obtained witness/maintenance information.

D Squad had some remarkable achievements and outstanding work performances. Multiple officers received compliments and awards for their above and beyond customer service to the guests of TPA. Officers Vic Gancedo and Bobby Tamboe received Exceptional Duty Awards for their swift actions in detaining a subject who armed himself with a knife in the kitchen area of Pei Wei at Airside A. Due to their actions, they were able to take the subject into custody before he could harm other patrons and workers in the area.

Multiple officers assisted with a male passenger who was having a heart attack on the Transfer Level. Officers quickly administered first aid to the subject until ARFF arrived. The actions of the officers undoubtedly helped to stabilize the passenger until he could be transported to the hospital for further treatment.

In June, Officer Tamboe witnessed a high-speed pursuit by The Florida Highway Patrol on Airport property that led to a traffic crash fatality. D Squad officers quickly located two suspects who fled the scene on foot and conducted traffic control for several hours as the Inbound Parkway was shut down until the traffic crash investigation was completed.

Throughout the year, the officers of D Squad showed exemplary customer service to the passengers and patrons of TPA on multiple occasions. They used their skills and knowledge to fully assist in a multitude of situations and keep the public safe. Their supervisory team couldn't be more proud to work with such a great group of officers.


Honor Guard and Bike Unit



The Honor Guard is comprised of eight officers who dedicate themselves to the solemn representation of fallen or deceased police officers and their families in need. They also present Colors at opening ceremonies for major events. In 2021, the Honor Guard participated in memorial events for 9-11 and fallen officer events. The Honor Guard has attended numerous funerals of police officers killed in the line of duty within the State of Florida, as well as retired officer funerals.

The Tampa Airport Police Department Bike Unit is utilized for high visibility patrol in the terminals, special events, covert patrol in the garages, and are a great community policing tool. The bikes are equipped with lights increased visibility and a rear patrol bag containing all the necessary paperwork and equipment for an officer during their shift.

The bike unit has a full strenath with certified members. All members must show capabilities physical necessary to safely



operate a bike in the demanding Florida environment. Bike members are responsible for handling calls just as patrol officers in a vehicle or on foot. They must show proficiency in bike skills each year to keep their bike membership intact. Bike members have been instrumental in completing several high priority calls, to include locating missing persons and suicidal subjects, as well as assisting airport patrons in their time of need.





The Tampa International Airport Police K9 Unit continues to demonstrate that it is one of the premier detection K9 Units in the nation. This has been a very busy year filled with high performance and a amount tremendous of change. Regardless of the task, the K9 Unit rose to every test and challenge. Once again, our unit surpassed over 2,000 proactive deployments related to explosives and narcotics detection. In addition to deployments, we conducted dozens of public demonstrations and covered security details related to the NFL, NHL, and the NCAA ensuring the safe movement of teams and their assets and provided protection for our nation's



leaders, and dignitaries from around the world.

A solemn task that our K9 Unit is often called to assist with is the movement of our nation's Fallen Service Heroes. All of our officers are humbled and grateful to support the men and women who sacrificed all for our nation. The coordination efforts between K9 and the Special Investigation's Unit resulted in proactive seizures of over 1,000 pounds of illegal drugs and hundreds and thousands of dollars seized in illicit funds. The K9 Unit routinely assists our fellow law enforcement agencies at the local, state, and federal level providing our canine teams as regional assets for the Tampa Bay area. Our most important mission though, is our daily encounters with the multitude of passengers that travel through the Tampa International Airport.



When it comes to change, the K9 Unit has been in the thick of it this year. With the retirement of K9 Vika, K9 Aatwood, and K9 Ikar, the unit welcomed aboard our newest detection dogs. K9 Tyson, a twoyear-old German Shepherd, is now partners with Corporal Traci Dietz, specializing in explosive detection. K9 Caleb, a two-year-old Belgian Malinois, is partners with Detective TJ Donnelly tasked with narcotics interdiction. The Special Investigations Unit (SIU) is led by Sergeant Kevin Durkin with six assigned Detectives, one Evidence Officer, and one Narcotics K9.

Officer Hamilton oversaw the removal of all of the department's evidence in order to relocate it to the new headquarters. During that operation, Officer Hamilton documented the location of each and every item of evidence, and then gave lists to her supervisor for determination as to retention or disposal. Over 2,100 items were disposed of, leaving approximately 1,000 items of evidence stored in the new evidence room. Officer Hamilton also sought out the disposing method for of marijuana. A subsequent audit of the new evidence department determined



that the move and subsequent disposals and retentions was 100% accurate.

SIU Narcotics Interdiction initiatives continued with great success during 2022. During the past year, 962 lbs. of bulk marijuana had been seized,



and \$296,628.00 in drug currency had been seized as well. 79 physical drug arrests were made, with several arrest warrants still active.

narcotic For his interdiction efforts, Detective Matt Ewing has nominated been Homeland Security Investigations Task Force Officer of the Year for 2022.

K9 Officer Donnelly has become renowned in the national Police K9 associations. During this rating period, he competed in the United States Police Canine Association Trials, where he placed 15th place overall, and 2nd place nationally for team searches. Though his dog has only been active for a few months, K9 Officer Donnelly still received a score of 100% for his annual certification. K9 Officer Donnelly utilizes a narcotic detection K9, and they are an integral component of the interdiction initiatives.

Airport Resource Officer

Airport Resource Officers, or AROs, are Traffic Specialists that are trained in accordance with our Police Field Training Program with regards to certain non-police related tasks, such as medical calls and lost & found calls.

Both a Police Officer and an ARO will be dispatched to a medical call. If the Officer determines that the call did not arise out of a criminal action or does not involve serious bodily injury or death, the Officer will turn the scene over the ARO. At that point, the ARO will complete the report and review and download all the relevant video footage from our GENETEC system. This allows your Police Officers to get back in service and focus on their main objective - keeping the Airport safe and secure and remaining highly visible.

Active Threat Exercise


