

Traffic Division


that descended on the Tampa Bay area ensuring a smooth transition through the airport.

Major construction continued throughout the terminal and Traffic was asked to support Operation Blue. This operation routed all blue side vehicle traffic into the short term parking garage to pick-up passengers. Traffic personnel managed rerouted traffic in support of Operation Blue for almost 5

months to facilitate the construction of the SkyConnect tracks.



The Traffic Division performs a myriad of tasks in and around the terminal and curbsides. We assist lost passengers, identify unattended bags, take of those who are sick and share a laugh with the traveling public. However, their main focus is moving traffic and there was a big

Hurricane Irma



On Friday September 8th, 2017, Hurricane Irma had intensified to a Category 5 Status and Travelers at Tampa International Airport were scrambling to depart the Tampa Bay area.

The decision was made to execute the Aviation Authority's Hurricane Response Plan. Members of the Public Safety and

Security Department advised were

prepare themselves and their families prior to an extended stay of working and sleeping 24/7 until Hurricane Irma had moved out of the area.

The Tampa International Airport Police Department had 36 Police, 18 AOC Dispatchers and 13 Traffic Specialists that remained at the Airport for the duration of Hurricane Irma, alternating 12-hour shifts composed of Dayshift and Nightshift

personnel. These personnel later became known as "Storm Riders." Dozens of Aviation Authority employees from Operations, Guest Services, Maintenance, Planning and Development, ARFF and

> others, joined the Storm Rider Team.

> Winds from Hurricane Irma hit upwards of 60 MPH. All flights inbound and outbound were cancelled on September 9th.

The airport saw downed trees, intrusion signs, water and widespread debris across the airfield.

The Airport Marriott reached

maximum capacity with stranded travelers and others seeking shelter from low lying areas. Food services were limited, but the restaurants that stayed remained open for extended hours to provide food. The Airport was reopened the morning of Tuesday September $\mathbf{12}^{\text{th}}$ – less than a day after the worst of the storm passed.

New Initiatives

In 2017, a decision was made to purchase a new dog. Not any ordinary canine, but an Explosive Detective Interdiction Canine (EDIC). The groundbreaking program is

facilitated by the Miami-Dade Police Department. Officer Chris Reggi was selected to attend the program and become the pioneer for this endeavor. Now, Tampa International Airport has a new tool in the fight to keep us safe: Anya, a three-year-old Belgian Malinois with a set of skills unlike any other at the Airport.

Officer Chris Reggi trained with Anya for 14 weeks with Metro-Dade K9 Services. She is recertified yearly, and continues training on a monthly basis in Miami.

Anya is specially trained in explosive detection and explosive odor pursuit and came to TPA on February 13, 2018, as part of the new



Explosive Detection Interdiction Canine program.

The program trains dogs to actively pursue explosives and detect odor at greater distances than conventional bomb-sniffing dogs would.

When Anya's not working, she's happy to be spending time with Officer Reggi, or playing with her Kong toy.

Sgt. Jeff Browning, who oversees TPA's K9 units, said officers often spend more time with their dogs than they do

their family.

"The dogs are the first thing they see when they wake up and the last thing they see before they go to sleep," he said.

Sgt. Browning says that all of the dogs in the K9 unit are incredible, but Anya is the best of the best.

"We would like to have more like Anya," he said. "She's amazing."

Airport Operations Center

The AOC welcomed an exciting variety of changes and events in 2017! The most notable of which was the addition of comfortable and stylish uniforms. With multiple shirt colors to choose from and matching jackets to keep dispatchers warm in the

cold center, we now look as cohesively as we perform. The uniforms were on full display, when we took advantage of a rare opportunity to leave the center and tour the new Rental Car Center together! For a team that is expected to know so much about airport geography and where to send help, this field trip was a fun and enriching way to identify the locations we had been hearing so much about. Some members on our team also enjoyed an exciting trip to the Operations Center at Walt Disney World!



This past year saw a heavier focus on developing training opportunities within the AOC. Training Supervisor Tony D'Aiuto led his team of dispatch trainers through a full-day course designed



specifically for improving consistency in AOC training efforts. A Training Coordinator position was also created to dedicate more resources to developing our team's skills and talent. Prior to taking a promotion in the Operations Department, Michael Patty briefly served in this role and enthusiastically trained our TPA Volunteer Ambassadors on how to assist at the Lost & Found window. Mike received great feedback from his training and the added assistance from the volunteers has been invaluable. We also started the process of cross-training several of our legacy dispatchers. These dispatchers have risen to new heights, by challenging their existing skills and expanding on new abilities.

Their efforts have built better connections among the team, and contributed to a genuine understanding and appreciation for the work each other delivers.

Cross-training isn't the only thing bringing our team closer together. The overwhelming assistance



The Police Lost and Found Property Room is responsible for the intake, cataloging, and dispositioning of items lost or abandoned on the Tampa International Airport premises. In 2017, 18,940 items were submitted into the Police Lost and Found Property Room with approximately 4,500 of those items returned to owner. Property not claimed is either auctioned, donated or used by the Authority. The Lost and Found Property Room will have an expansion of its



CFA Accreditation



Maintaining High Standards



In November 2015, our department began our process to become state accredited by the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA). CFA was developed through a joint task force with executive members from the Florida Police Chiefs Association and the Florida Sheriffs Association. CFA and the standards it promulgates are supported as best practices for professional law enforcement agencies in Florida.

The accreditation process is recognized as a means of maintaining the highest standards of professionalism. The process requires an in-depth review of every aspect of an agency to include its organization, management, operation, and administrative functions and also increases cooperation and coordination with other law enforcement agencies and other branches of the criminal justice system.

Police Administration

ticket and citation collection, records management, staff uniform and equipment orders, department supply orders, and budget management. Patrol Division



The Tampa International Airport Police Department is an Accredited Law Enforcement Agency comprised of 69 sworn Police Officers. The Airport Police

Department's Patrol Division acts, not only as a full-service law enforcement agency, but hosts a variety of other duties and responsibilities. In addition to the civil and criminal functions of a conventional police department, Tampa Airport Police Officers must also be cognizant of Federal regulations and often assist TSA and Customs agents when police action is warranted.

The primary function of the Patrol Division includes, but is not limited to: Protection of life and safety of our passengers, guests, and employees of the Aviation Authority; the maintenance of public order; the documentation and preliminary investigation of criminal offenses; proactive and preventative patrol; traffic law enforcement; and a myriad of customer related support such as medical fall documentation,

passenger assistance, lost and found property, conflict resolution and general calls for service.

2017 was a busy year for the Tampa Airport Police Department as they were charged with the safety and security of several major events, such as the NCAA National Championship Game which brought thousands of people from all over the country. In addition to the thousands of passengers on commercial flights, it was necessary to close Runway 10/28 to accommodate the large number of private charters attending the game. Hurricane Irma traveled across Central Florida and closed Tampa International Airport which required 36 Officers or "Storm Riders" to spend over 80 continuous hours on property tending to the welfare of the airport in addition to stranded passengers while Irma passed through.

With the advent of the Rental Car Center (RCC), a host of new opportunities and challenges face the Airport Police Department. In addition to the enlarged footprint of passengers and guests, the RCC and Economy Parking Garage represent 10-15% of our passenger base in two distinct locations approximately 1.5 miles from each other, RCC and Main Terminal. This breadth represents an increased demand to employ a continued level of quality service to our passengers and guests.

The Officers of the Tampa Airport Police Department take pride in their work and strive to conduct and complete a comprehensive investigation of all incidents involving airport operations. With the proficient use of the HCAA extensive camera system and advance investigative



technology, Officers are often able to resolve incidents in a timely fashion. From quickly locating lost property to identifying and arresting perpetrators of theft, Airport Police Officers are committed to finding a conclusion to their cases whenever possible. The Tampa Airport Police Officers are also committed to ensuring our passengers and guests receive the best overall experience at Tampa International Airport. Their exemplary service has contributed to the numerous accolades received from its patrons, and helped Tampa International Airport be recognized as one of the best airports in the nation.

K9 Unit

The K9 Unit started a busy 2017 in January by providing explosive detection services at TPA for the College Football Playoff National Championship Game teams during arrival and departure.

They also assisted in keeping all the Tampa Bay game events safe as part of the Tampa Bay Regional EOD K-9 Task Force and the Tampa Police Department at the Gasparilla Children's Parade and the Gasparilla Parade. The unit also participated in Take Your Child To Work Day on April 27, 2017.



On Saturday, June 17, 2017 Officer Traci Dietz and K-9 Vika were awarded the K-9 Officer's Award at the Sunshine State Cluster Dog Show at the Florida State Fairgrounds. The award is sponsored by the American Kennel Club through local satellite clubs; the St. Pete Dog Fanciers Association and the Greater Venice Dog Club. Officer Traci Dietz and K-9 Vika were nominated and selected out of approximately twenty law enforcement canine entrants from West Central Florida. Traci and Vika were chosen for their work during the 2016 Presidential Election where they provided explosive detection services as well as their dedication to the canine program at the Tampa International Airport.

This is a new award for the AKC and they expect to recognize more canine teams in the future. Congratulations, Officer Dietz and K-9 Vika!

The unit participated in the Lunch n Learn for HCAA employees.



The K-9 Unit were vital during Hurricane Irma, and they conducted sweeps of all four airsides to return to normal operation after the hurricane passed through.

Officer Chris Reggi was selected to train for the EDIC dog and will complete his training in Miami for 2018. In November, Officer John Preyer joined the unit and will attend the mandatory TSA course in Lackland during 2018 to obtain his partner.



Professional Standards Unit

The Professional Standards Unit (PSU) conducts all recruitment and hiring activities for the department. PSU participates in recruitment events throughout the community to solicit the best candidate for employment with police and traffic divisions, as well as the Airport

Operations Center (AOC). PSU administers testing of applicants and conducts a thorough background investigation of selected candidates. During 2017, PSU Investigators conducted 20 background investigations resulting in the hiring of 10 new police officers, 8 traffic specialists, 1 AOC dispatcher and 1 administrative

personnel to fill vacant positions.

PSU is the training arm of the department, responsible for identifying training needs, formulating or acquiring training solutions and implementing training programs. This ensures that all department members are receiving comprehensive, effective guidance on a variety of topics.

PSU is also accountable for tracking all compliments and complaints initiated by airport patrons as well as internal complaints. The expectation of airport patrons is that department members conduct themselves with the highest level of integrity and discipline. PSU assists in ensuring that the



airport patron's confidence in the department remains high by thoroughly investigating all allegations of misconduct and developing a fair assessment of any reported incident. PSU investigates all complaints and matters of internal discipline to include customer service issues, deviation from agency policy and biased based profiling complaints.

Bias-based profiling occurs when, whether intentionally or unintentionally, an officer applies his or her own personal, societal, or organizational biases or stereotypes when making decisions or taking police action, and the ONLY reason for that decision or action is because of a person's race, ethnicity, background, gender, sexual orientation, religion, economic status, age, culture or other personal characteristic, rather than due to the observed behavior of the individual or the identification of the individual as being, having been, or about to be engaged in criminal activity. It is the policy of the Tampa International Airport Police Department to protect the constitutional rights of all people, regardless of race, color, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, physical handicap, religion or other belief system or physical characteristic; and to treat each person with respect and dignity. While contacting persons in a variety of situations is not only routine, but also germane to law enforcement activities, the agency will not accept or tolerate bias-based profiling. Criminal Investigations Unit



The Tampa International Airport
Police Department (TIAPD) has four detectives assigned to the Criminal Investigations Unit (CIU). Their duties include follow up investigations on criminal cases, with an emphasis on anticipating crime trends. The detectives also partner with other federal, state and local agencies in an effort to combat crime.

During the first half of 2017, Tampa International Airport experienced a dramatic increase in thefts of rental cars, with ninety (90) car thefts reported. The CIU detectives worked closely with

other local law enforcement agencies, which resulted in the arrests of numerous sub-contracted rental car drivers and cleaners. The arrests of the "insiders" at the airport resulted in a dramatic decrease of stolen autos.

As the detectives were combating the auto thefts, they also connected with the car rental agencies in order to deter future thefts. Security procedures were reviewed with each car rental agency, and subsequent security enhancements proved to be a substantial deterrent to the auto thefts as well. For their efforts in combating the auto theft challenge and reducing auto thefts by 95%, the detectives in CIU were recognized by TIAPD with Exceptional Duty awards.

Criminal Investigations Unit detectives anticipated that individuals who had been deterred from stealing rental cars would try to employ other tactics to get the cars. As credit card counterfeiting and credit card fraud increased in the Tampa Bay area, the detectives provided credit card fraud/counterfeiting detection training to all the car rental agencies. The partnership between the TIAPD detectives and the car rental agencies proved to be very beneficial. These efforts have resulted in numerous fraudulent rental attempts being discovered prior to any car rental agency having to actually experience the loss. There is daily interaction between the detectives and rental car agencies where information is shared.

CIU detectives also participate in federal task forces, and their duties include the detection and seizure of contraband. These detectives are also frequently called upon by other law enforcement agencies to assist in the apprehension of suspects who come through the airport and the securing of evidence pertaining to different investigations.

TIAPD Gives Back!

Every year, the department opens their hearts and finds ways to give back to the

community. For years, we have participated in Special Olympics events and various campaigns with the Authority, such as United Way and Toys for Tots. The Toys for Tots campaign encourages employees to bring in new, unwrapped toys which are then provided to underprivileged children in our community. TIAPD members donned their Santa hats and went full speed ahead to help the Authority.





This year the Traffic Division stepped up to the challenge and 91% of traffic personnel donated to United Way Campaign. Due to their high level of participation, they were treated to a Goody Goody Burger luncheon with our CEO Joe Lopano.

After the goal was reached, Mr. Lopano stated in his email: "We would also like to recognize the extraordinary efforts of our Public Safety and Security team (Police, Traffic and AOC) towards this cause as their generous donations of 1,142 toys was instrumental to this toy drive."

The true winner of the event was the local children, who through our generosity received a small token of our love during the Christmas season.

Metropolitan Ministries held its annual food drive for those in need during the Thanksgiving season. Members of CIU, PSU and K9 made a contribution to this cause, and then made a presentation to Jack Harris and Tedd Webb of 970 WFLA.
